Kathy reported the State of Indiana's 80% reimbursement for Territorial Engineering's first billing was processed more quickly than expected. This billing was for survey work and approximately one-half of the design work for the DNR's ITP #23-03 grant to extend the trail northwest through North Judson. Sources for payment to Territorial from the Northwest Extension fund were the Luminous Fund and the Knox VFW. Reimbursement was directed to a new category called "DNR Reimbursement". This restricted fund will be used for subsequent stages of the trail extension as the project progresses.

Kathy said for purposes of identifying restricted and unrestricted funds, she allocated the two payments to J&K Excavating, purchase of the glyphosate, and the first \$100 mowing payment to K&G Lawn Service from among the mower sale fund, the Hardesty Memorial Fund, and the Verhagen grant made through NICF. Going forward the Mower Sale & NICF/Verhagen funding category will be referenced as NICF/Verhagen and used

solely for mowing and related maintenance in the former rest park adjacent to the Erie Trail crossing of Indiana State Road 10.

Bob Albert, Liaison from the Hoosier Valley Railroad Museum, asked about the quantity of limestone used for the new parking area adjacent to Starke County Road 700 East. Paul Byer responded that it was approximately 70 cubic yards and the cost of the project included leveling. Bob said that was a "pretty good price", and Rich Vallicelli agreed.

Paul moved for approval of the Treasurer's Report and Report of Restricted and Unrestricted Funds. Diane Blais seconded the motion, and the motion carried.

Northwest Trail Extension Workgroup Report

During the April meeting there was discussion concerning the route for trail placement in North Judson near a signal bungalow. At the time Bob Aloi expressed hope the issue was resolved, but further discussions have been scheduled at an onsite meeting set for June 7.

Maintenance Workgroup Report

Paul and Linda Byer reported that despite often unfavorable conditions, both high winds and an unusually large amount of rain, they have treated the trail with Glyphosate to help control encroaching plants. Steve Lucas reflected the undertaking was a huge endeavor and thanked them for their efforts. The results were particularly noteworthy along the portion of the trail where the 5K Run and 3K Walk is to be held.

Paul and Linda removed a fallen tree west of the Fell Ditch Bridge. The tree had blocked the trail completely.

<u>Final Preparations for May 25 5K Run 3K Walk and Bike Ride on the Great</u> American Rail-Trail

Brian McMillin reported good progress on preparations for the event. Members have succeeded in getting the word out through Facebook, the BLPOA, the PTC website, and printed media. After a slow start with event sign-ups, committed participation has reached the 40s, well exceeding our expected turnout. The emphasis is shifting from how to get people to come to how to maximize safety and provide a fun atmosphere. Brian asked those helping with management of the event to arrive at 7:15 am, CDT, to make the final preparations.

<u>Final Preparations for Hosting Warrior Expeditions Trekkers on the Great American Rail- Trail</u>

This year the Warrior Expeditions' seven trekkers on the Great American Rail-Trail are Brandon Blankenship, KP Haueter, Michael Kohler, Callie Leaver, Allen Megginson, Suzanne Williamson and John Wirth. They began their journey at Washington, DC on May 8. On May 22 John and Michael were at Miamisburg and the other five at London, Ohio.

Kathy said because she and Steve have a home immediately adjacent to the trail, they are well-suited to be the point of contact for the trekkers. In small groups they can also provide overnight accommodations. But she said they would appreciate assistance with an evening group meal and possibly with overnight accommodations if the group came at the same time. Diane said she and Russ would host an evening meal, and they could also provide assistance with overnight stays. Peg also agreed to help with meals. Char noted that she and Corey now have a vacation home adjacent to the trail and might be able to receive trekkers in the future.

<u>Development of Facebook Blasts to Identify PTC Accomplishments and Challenges</u>

Char provided an overview of a new initiative to highlight PTC accomplishments and challenges. She thanked Carolla Heilstadt for her wonderful assistance with the effort. The current emphasis is upon communications through Facebook. Char provided an overview for how members can maximize the algorithms for explanations of what the PTC does in support of the trail and for trails and greenways and blueways generally. Rich expressed a continuing importance for the PTC to communicate positive messages.

Update on Bass Lake—Erie Trail Signage

As reported in November and December 2023 meetings, Kathy Carrier has graciously provided funding for signage to improve understanding of the proximity of the trail to Bass Lake and particularly the Bass Lake Beach and Campground. With Kathy Carrier's guidance, Yancy Lucas designed five signs for the project. These were manufactured by OTES and picked up by Steve and Kathy Lucas on April 2, 2024.

Kathy Lucas reported she and Steve met on May 21 with Tracy Williams, Superintendent for the Starke County Parks Department, to discuss placement of two signs at the Bass Lake Beach and Campground. Tracy agreed to place the "You Are Here" sign on the chain link fence for the Beach near the junction of Indiana State Road 10 and Starke County Road 600 East. She also agreed to place a general information sign (which is not site specific) within the Campground.

Additionally to be placed are two directional signs (one for southeast bound traffic and one for northwest bound traffic) on the trail at its intersection with SCR 600 E, as well as the final general information sign. During the meeting Russ Blais agreed to spearhead an effort to identify businesses who would like to be listed on a link to the QR code that is included on all five signs.

Report of April 25 Greenways Foundation Trails Celebration Luncheon

Steve said that PTC members Tabitha Balzer, Kirt Verhagen, Brian, Russ, Kathy and he shared a table at the annual Greenways Foundation Luncheon. For the first time the meeting was held in Indianapolis near Lucas Oil Stadium. The PTC members were later join by Michelle Lagestee, President, and Charlotte Groet, member, of the Jasper County Trails Club.





Trail Counters Report

Joan Hardesty provided an updated trail counters report and circulated printed graphics. She expressed great disappointment that someone found and dismantled one of the trail counters then left its key components in the open. They were filled with rain water, and the counter has been destroyed.

Members expressed a consensus that data collected from the trail counters is valuable to the PTC and is an important statement to legislators of the importance of trails to its constituents. The possibility of purchasing a replacement trail counter will be discussed at a future meeting when Joan is available.

Report of April 27 "Celebrate Trails Day 2024" Event

But those in attendance of April 27 were pleasantly surprised to learn upon arrival that Paul had previously accomplished the move on his own. With assistance from Russ, Brian staked key elements of the 5K Run/3K Walk. Members also tidied the trailhead area. With help from Diane and Anita, Rhonda cooked a lunch with hot dogs, chips, and cookies

Review of Hoosier Valley Railroad Museum Activities

Bob Albert reported that the HVRM is moving into the high tourist season with both diesel excursions and steam excursions. He added that "Civilians and Soldiers Day" has been set for July 25. The event includes period re-enactors and was a big success last summer.

Rails-to-Trails Conservancy Provides Great American Rail-Trail Signage

Steve reported the Rails-to-Trails Conservancy has provided four free signs to identify the Erie Trail as host to the Great American Rail-Trail. One of these was placed at the trailhead on Starke County Road 600 East and a second at the US Highway 35 crossing. The other two signs are currently slated for the trail crossing of State Road 10 (and State Road 39) and the other for the trailhead at Main Street in North Judson.
